November 2

Theme: Day of the Graceful Death

We commemorate Day of the Dead as we begin to explore our new theme of grace. What is grace? Is it only a theological concept that we UUs have been challenged by? Grace is hard to define yet recognizable (for some!) when it "graces" us. We will acknowledge our loved ones gracefully, as we also think through this concept.

November 9

Well, the church year is off and running and what a busy hive of activity we have become! November is proving to be no exception either, so perhaps it is a good time to welcome our new theme of grace. Just saying the word feels like a breath of fresh air; a momentary respite; an unearned smile curling up on my lips. When our lives are busy and overscheduled, grace steps in to stops us, mostly for good. An exercise one of the Soul Matters participants might engage in this month involves this: Give Your Schedule over to Grace: Put your To-Do List down for a day. Ignore your schedule. Commit to giving up all plans or expectations. Simply spend the day letting grace guide your agenda. Treat it as an experiment, testing the hypothesis that grace and giftedness is all around and wants to lure you in. I invite you to consider trying it for yourself.

November is a big month for us since we will working on a new vision statement. If you haven't signed up yet for one of the three workshops on Nov. 15, I invite you to do so. We mean it when we say that every voice is important. On the success of the model we used five years ago, we will use it again, especially since quite possibly it will allow space for grace to enter and guide the way. For the majority of the congregation it will only involve three and a half hours of your time. I hope you can see your way to this sacred conversation.

This year FCU will be hosting the annual Interfaith Thanksgiving Service on Sunday, November 23 at 7pm. A joyous occasion, the Deacons and I are looking forward to seeing a good FCU turnout. Jon Welch is our speaker and we are inviting everyone (from all five churches!) to bring a non-perishable item for the cornucopia we will create and then deliver to Loaves and Fishes.

In living a life of "Grace" let us all be 'grace-watchers', keeping our eyes and hearts open to its experience, and 'grace-givers' finding a way, opportunity, chance to bestow a random act of grace anonymously to a fellow congregant of any age group. Secret smiles are just as delicious as known ones.

Spiritual Development for Children and Youth (and those who care about them)

"GRACE"

Grace who? Of course that is an old joke but it is always the first thing that comes to my mind when I hear the word. Perhaps that is because I have never been able to satisfactorily understand just what grace means. Since this is the theme for this month, I decided to make another attempt at understanding. I did some research, reading, and thinking.

One definition from a religious perspective is: "The infinite love, mercy, favor, and goodwill shown to humankind by God." Another, which I find more consistent with my thinking is "a generosity of spirit: a capacity to tolerate, accommodate, or forgive." But then I found many more descriptions of grace: some common threads are: openness, receptiveness, emptiness, suffering, love, compassion, mercy, gratitude, forgiveness, unsought, unearned, serendipitous, blessing.

And my two favorite quotes (which seem to be opposites and yet somehow together they bring a completeness of understanding to me):

"Grace is not part of consciousness; it is the amount of light in our souls, not knowledge nor reason." Pope Francis

"Rain is grace; rain is the sky descending to the earth; without rain, there would be no life." John Updike

I think I have felt something akin to grace in those moments when my mind is quiet and I am simply open to my surroundings, to the universe, to the light both within and without. Some unforeseen insight or occurrence comes with startling clarity like a cleansing rain. It becomes part of me, something I return to again and again.

And of course, grace is what some say before a meal perhaps because this is a special time when we open ourselves to that feeling of gratitude for all that we have, for blessings unbidden. Perhaps, saying grace together is a place to begin to share the feeling of grace with our children. Thanksgiving seems the perfect opportunity. Here is one possibility from the Zuni people:

"So long as we enjoy the light of day, may we greet one another with love.

"So long as we enjoy the light of day, may we pray for one another."

Littleton Country Fair 2014 Final Report

Thanks be to you, all you wonderful members of our church community, for once again putting on a great Country Fair! One of the security officers for the Fair at day's end told me that he had never seen such a happy well-coordinated team in his life as those of us who put on the Fair this year!

The final financial report is now ready. The 2014 Fair grossed 13,496.01 dollars, had 2,665.67dollars in expenses, paid 10% of our net to the Littleton Park and Recreation Department's Christmas Gifts Fund for the children of Littleton, and ended up making our church (drum roll please!) 9,747.31 dollars. For the budget-watchers among us, this is 1,252.69 dollars less than the 11,000 dollars our Fair was budgeted to make this fiscal year.

Considering that the weather was cold and cloudy, the Fair was pushed back a week to make room for the Littleton 300th celebration, the various obstacles that needed to be overcome or dealt with or just lived with due to the Littleton 300th celebration, and that we had a lot of changes in key Fair leadership positions this year, I think we did really well.


