WELCOME BACK!!

From Your Interim Minister, Warm Greetings to Members and Friends of FCU!

I am still in the "getting to know you" stage of our interim ministry right now, and am looking forward to our time together over the next two years.

You are the third congregation I've served as an interim minister following my 24 year ministry with the Unitarian Universalist Church of Nashua, New Hampshire. My wife, Michele, and I continue to reside in Nashua. We have a son, daughter-in-law, and grand-daughter who live in southern Maine.

An interim ministry period is a time of unique possibility in the life of a congregation. It's a time for some self-reflection as to where you've been as a religious community, what has brought you to the point where you currently find yourselves, and where you wish to go—and the kind of ministerial leadership you desire—to help get you there. I feel we have some fruitful conversations ahead of us!

In looking to our first few Sundays together in the upcoming weeks, I'm going to do a slight twist on the Soul Matters theme for September of "Invitation." I'm going to focus on the idea of "Call" or "Calling." What is it that calls us back together, after a summer break, as a liberal religious congregation? What is it about the life of your congregation that calls you to faithfulness to it? And what have been some of the "callings" over the course of your life that have brought you to the spiritual place in which you now find yourselves? I'll post fuller descriptions of these matters below.

On a more nuts and bolts level, I'll be starting my regular office hours on Tuesday, September 8, and will be there from 9:30 am until 12:30 pm. Other times by appointment are certainly available. I'll be in the office, with these hours, on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Friday is my worship prep day, and I work from my home study in Nashua. Monday is my day off.

I'm ready to roll! Let's be on our way!

September 13: Beckonings...What Calls us Back.

This is a brief homily to go with the Ingathering and Water Communion. It's based on an encounter I had several years ago with an airport ticket and baggage agent who, when he saw the "Reverend" in front of my name on my reservation, decided he needed to talk to a minister right in the middle of the bags he was checking and the boarding passes he was issuing. The way he called me aside—as he beckoned me towards him—has long stood as a metaphor for me as to how our faith "calls" us in so many, and often unexpected, ways. What calls—or invites—you back to your religious community as we begin a pivotal two years in your congregational life?

September 20: The Call of the Third Place.

"Third Place" is a sociological term. The Third Place (with First Place as family and Second Place as career/job/profession) is where one goes for additional dimensions of meaning, purpose, depth, and community in one's life—in addition to what is found in the First and Second Places. For many persons

their religious community is that Third Place. I'll use this concept to help launch this interim ministry period we'll be spending together. Building on what I briefly introduced in the 9/13 service, we'll explore what it means for a liberal religious congregation such as this one to be your Third Place; and how you want to grow it as you anticipate the next phase of you congregational life.

September 27: The Absence of God and the Call of the Sacred.

This sermon draws on a book by Dr. Sam Keen titled *The Absence of God and the Presence of the Sacred*. It's about where one goes when the gods of both the religious and secular realms no longer work. How do we find a sacred or holy dimension to life and living in the absence of a Supreme Being? Dr. Keen speaks well to this. I'll also use this sermon to share some of my own religious and spiritual journey from evangelical Christianity to Unitarian Universalism, and how I've responded to the various callings of the spiritual landscapes I've moved across.

Standing Committee Notes

How can summer be coming to a close? Wasn't it just June?

We are planning for an exciting transition year here at FCU. Our interim minister, Steve Edington, has been meeting with many committees over the last month as we identify some of the issues that need to be resolved by the time we submit our package for a settled minister during the fall of 2016.

These are some of the issues that the Standing Committee has on our agenda. Our first, most important job is to create conversations in our community about a whole host of issues. This is our collective church community and we want to make decisions that are based on what we hear from you. So expect that we will be seeking your input often!

<u>Please save the date for **Sunday, October 25, 2015 at 11:30** for a warranted meeting. We will be discussing the following issues:</u>

- 1. Raising funds through a capital campaign to address multiple issues with our building
- 2. Addressing the issues related to our use of the parsonage including seeking a court ruling on the issue of ownership
- 3. Process for calling a Search Committee and timetable for the search

A meeting to discuss the warrant will be held on **Sunday, October 3**, immediately following coffee hour. We urge you to bring your questions, concerns, feedback, and input to this meeting for full and frank discussion.

A Note About the Warrant Process

We invite and encourage you to bring any issues you would like to see voted upon at a warranted meeting to the Standing Committee well in advance of the meeting for inclusion in the warrant, which is posted at the church and read on each of the three Sundays preceding the meeting. **This is a key element of the church's democratic process.**

The warrant is publicized for those three weeks so that each member of the congregation can give full deliberation to the issues upon which they are asked to vote. When an issue is brought up from the floor, members are not given time to research, discuss, or think about it; it may not receive the full discussion or consideration necessary during the meeting; members who might wish input on that issue may not attend the meeting, not expecting it to come up.

If there's an issue you feel the church body should address, please contact any member of the Standing Committee by **October 1, 2015**. That will give us the opportunity to include it on the warrant and ensure it can be discussed at the October 3 meeting, and subsequently if necessary.

Transition Team

The Standing Committee voted to appoint Joel Ross as Chair of the Transition Team. This group will support our interim minister and the congregation during the search process, and will replace the Committees on Ministry during the interim period. Team members will be David Butz, Martha Child, Araya Fast, and Carol Tillis.

Governance Task Force

At the Annual Meeting in May, there were several requests for a Governance Committee to review our leadership model. Jim Nehring agreed to chair this group.

The charges for both the Transition Team and the Governance Task Force are posted on the bulletin board.

We'd like to thank Laura Semple, Susan Tordella Williams, and Bob Williams for the amazing job they did cleaning out the church basement. This is truly the kind of community we are, finding a need and stepping up to take it on.

As a final note, this will be a year for us to take some risks and try new things. We invite everyone on board to take this journey with us as we embark on the quest that will end with a new settled minister. We hope to hear from all of you in the coming months about the many issues that will shape who we are as a community.

Multicultural Ministries Committee

We'd like to draw your attention to some of the work coming out of General Assembly held in Portland, Oregon, this year, in particular the Actions of Immediate Witness (AIW), all three of which include aspects of racial justice.

Support the Black Lives Matter Movement

This AIW urges member congregations to take initiative in collaboration with local and national organizations fighting for racial justice against the harsh racist practices to which many black people are exposed.

Support a Strong, Compassionate Global Climate Agreement in 2015: Act for a Livable Climate

In addition to the focus on the December 2015 UN Climate Agreement Talks in Paris, it asks that UUs support the Lummi Nations, local to Portland, in their opposition to coal terminals on sacred lands.

End Immigrant Child and Family Detention Now

This action asks for humane treatment and alternatives to incarceration for all immigrants. It specifically looks for the immediate closure of all family detention centers.


