Share-the-Plate

Mary, Joan and Nancy Scholarship for Courage and Compassion

Ten years ago, First Church members and friends generously supported me in a 4000 mile, solo bicycle journey from Boston to Seattle. The fundraising bike ride established an endowed scholarship at UMass Lowell for first generation college students planning a career in teaching. Ten years later, it is changing lives. So far, nine first-generation students who plan a career in teaching have been the recipient of the Mary, Joan, and Nancy Scholarship for courage and compassion.

College costs continue to rise, while income inequality grows wider. Fully one third of UMass Lowell undergrads are first generation college students, many from immigrant families who struggle to pay for college.

That's why this summer, I hope to double the scholarship endowment by rowing a boat I built myself 500 miles from New York City to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. Over the last three summers, I've rowed approximately 430 miles. This summer, as a fundraising event, I'll make the final 70 mile sprint from Kitty Hawk to the Lighthouse at Cape Hatteras.

During our service this Sunday, I'll share more about the scholarship, the rowing journey, the financial need of our students, and lives changed.

Please give generously, whatever you can, and together we'll tag the lighthouse at Hatteras!


