Join us Sunday, March 7 at 10:00 for “Whose Am I?”



Thoughts


We nod in agreement with the phrase “Racism hurts us all”, but how seriously do we regard it? How deeply does it affect us? One example that wormed its way into my being, struck my heart, and became part of my soul is from 1959 with ramifications to today. Montgomery, Alabama had built a beautiful park and large public pool for all WHITES to enjoy. When civil rights laws were enacted, the pool was forced to be open to all. But the town leaders decided to drain the pool rather than allow blacks to swim. As a kid who spent many summer days in my own municipal pool I felt the outrage of all those kids and parents! And this happened all over the country, not just the south.

This tangible example of the phrase “Racism Hurts us All” is only the first in Heather McGhee’s TED talk, https://www.ted.com/talks/heather_c_mcgee_racism_has_a_cost_for_everyone?utm_source=tedcomshare&utm_medium=email&utm_campaign=tedsread and the beginning of her study presented in her book, “The Sum of Us”. She goes on to explore how our “zero-sum” thinking is detrimental to our infrastructure, our unions, our schools, our politics, our environment - our country.
