

The musical selections this Sunday, April 23rd, will celebrate the vibrant sounds of the Earth. The Prelude is a part of a longer suite written exactly three hundred years ago in 1723 by Italian violinist Antonio Vivaldi. His Four Seasons suite for a string chamber orchestra with a solo violinist presents music for each of the seasons - he even includes notes in the score for interpretation, like "bird song" and "the gentle sprinkle of rain." The Offertory comes from the pen of contemporary composer Philip Glass and is a song featured in the 1982 film Koyaanisqatsi, which explores how technology can throw nature and ecology off kilter; the title is a Hopi Indian word meaning "life out of balance." The Postlude by classical composer Felix Mendelssohn is a fun, carefree exploration of the hopefulness of spring. The Anthem, sung by the Church Choir today, offers a text to encourage you to move "forward like a river running free" and experience the beauty of nature.

History of the Nashobah Praying Indians: Doings, Sufferings, Tragedy, and Triumph

Please join Strong Bear Medicine and Quiet Storm of the Nashobah Praying Indians at the Littleton Historical Society building on Sunday April 23 for an open house celebration of the newly released book: *History of the Nashobah Praying Indians*. Meet and mingle with Strong Bear and Quiet Storm, and author, Littleton historian Daniel V. Boudillion. Have your books signed, partake of refreshments, and enjoy Native music performed by Strong Bear and Quiet Storm.

As many of you know (and as Rev. Lara preached about on October 9, 2022), the town of Littleton was originally created in 1654 as the Praying Indian Plantation of Nashobah. Told in its entirety for the first time, this is the story of the Nashobah Praying Village and the Nashobah Praying Indians, whose descendants are still honoring their heritage and with us today.

Sabbatical refresh | rest | refocus —

It's time to start planning for Rev. Lara's first FCU sabbatical:

We wanted to take this opportunity to introduce ourselves and let you know a bit about our work. In March we were charged by the Standing Committee to help with the planning for Rev. Lara's much deserved sabbatical from the end of January to mid-May, 2024. We know you will join with us in celebrating our minister and the fact that we can offer her this opportunity to grow, refresh and deepen her own spiritual life, as we will do the same.

So just what is a sabbatical? Sabbatical leave is a tradition for Unitarian Universalist clergy that offers an extended time for study, reflection, rest, and renewal—all ingredients for effective ministry. Usually taken after approximately five to seven years of service, sabbatical leave is part of the congregation's covenant agreement with Lara as our minister.

Just as importantly, the congregation will benefit as Lara returns refreshed, filled with new ideas and with rekindled energy. Further, it offers the staff and congregation the opportunity to undertake our own exploration, hear from different voices and engage our own spiritual journeys in a new way.

Perhaps more than anything, it is a way for us to show our deep appreciation of Rev. Lara's ministry by investing in her continued growth and our own.

As a task force of the Standing Committee, we do not own all the work of preparation for this time, but we hope we can be a conduit to the congregation keeping you apprised of plans.

Of course, Rev. Lara is planning how she will spend her sabbatical and we're sure she will share those plans as the time comes closer. The Standing Committee is making important decisions on budgeting and how ministerial duties will be covered in Lara's absence.

The deacons are deep in conversation about the ways we, as a congregation, can use this time to tend to our community spirit. Other church committees and, certainly, our wonderful staff will have roles in planning and leading us through the time. The role of the sabbatical team is to create the overarching plan that brings all these groups together to provide worship, pastoral care and administration and then to communicate that plan to the FCU community. And best of all, we will honor this special time and this wonderful ministry with celebrations at Lara's leave-taking and return!

Rev. Lara's sabbatical is nearly a full year off, but we know how quickly a year can go so we invite you to start thinking about how you want to be part of this exciting time. Do you have a service topic you've always wanted to explore? A class you've wanted to lead? Other skills you want to build in beloved community?

Details on opportunities and how you can engage this time will be shared as plans unfold.

We look forward to what we know will be an exciting time of exploration and growth!
